Prerequisite: SAT Math score, placement examination, or a grade of C– or higher in MATH 099.

Course Description: MATH 101 is the second in a two-course sequence in elementary and intermediate algebra (MATH 099/MATH 101) designed to provide students with a foundation to study college level mathematics. MATH 101 carries three credits that count toward meeting the minimum number of credits required for graduation but do not satisfy the general education requirement. Mastery of material in this course is necessary for success in mathematics and statistics courses with numbers greater than 100 and for courses in the natural and social sciences. You must earn a C– or higher in MATH 101 to meet the prerequisite for any Skill Area II general education course.

The major goals of this course are:

- a. to gain an appreciation for the role variables play in constructing mathematical models;
- b. to use tables, graphs, and equations to model mathematical situations;
- c. to gain facility in using the symbolism of algebra to solve equations and find equivalent expressions;
- d. to gain facility in solving word problems; and
- e. to gain an appreciation for the applications of algebra to a wide variety of “real world” situations.

Textbook: *Elementary and Intermediate Algebra: A Practical Approach* by T. Craine, J. McGowan, and T. Ruben, published by Houghton Mifflin (ISBN 0-618-10337-6). Note: This textbook is used for both MATH 099 and MATH 101.

Coverage: In MATH 101 you are responsible for all of the material in Chapters 7-12 except for the optional sections marked with an asterisk (*). The six chapters will be covered in the order they appear in the text. Each section has 25 problems at the end, 15 new problems and 10 skill and review problems. All problems will be assigned and you are expected to work all of them.

Course Requirements: Attend and participate in class regularly; complete homework assignments; take quizzes and tests, as scheduled. A general rule for any college course is that you are expected to put in at least 2 hours of work outside of class for every hour in class. **For MATH 101, the expectation is at least 6 hours per week outside of class.**

Homework Policy: Students will be assigned homework every class except before a test. At the beginning of the next class we will go over the home work. You may make corrections at this time, but you may not finish your homework during class. After we finish going over the homework, I will collect it and record only the assignments that are completely finished. You should not turn in any assignment that is not completed and you need to show all steps and all work done. You can still receive full credit if you complete it and turn it in to me at the next class. After that, you will receive no credit for the assignment. **At the end of the course, if you have completed all of the assignments, I will add three points to your final average. I will add two points if you are missing only one assignment and one point if you are missing only two assignments.**

Calculator Use: Graphing calculators are required for MATH 101. The textbook is based on the TI-83 and the TI-84, and I will be using one of these in class. Please let me know if you are using some other calculator, and I can help you make adjustments.

Electronic Devices Policy: Cell phones, laptops, MP3's, PDA's, or any form of personal electronic or communication devices, are not to be used during class, exams, or quizzes unless special accommodations are necessary. **No texting during class time.**

The average for the course will be based on the following weights: There will be 3 tests given. **Each test will count 18% and the average of the unannounced quizzes will count 21%.** The department **Final Exam will count 25%.** If more than two quizzes are given, then I will drop the lowest quiz. Also, the grade on the final, if to your advantage, will replace the lowest class test. **But please note that there are no make up tests or quizzes allowed. If one regular test is missed, then the grade will be entered as a zero and the grade on the final exam will replace that grade. Any Quizzes missed exceeding the one that will be dropped, as indicated earlier, will be recorded as a zero**

The final exam is set by the Department and consists of 30% skills and 70% graphs and problem solving.

Note: In order to receive the grade of C- or better for the course, you must receive the grade of at least 60% on the final exam.
